2	Iain Pennell (Senior Director & Sector Leader) of CriticalArc who own Safezone thanked everyone for the opportunity to present to HEIDS.			
	Iain provided an overview of CriticalArc, noting they have over 4 million users and operational in over 80 countries, with a committed and engaged user community. He highlighted the challenges faced within our sector including major incident readiness, out of bounds communications and the requirements related to Martyn's law.			
	He provided an overview of the solution including international travel support, focussing on mass and targeted notifications. The integration opportunities for enhancing student experience, cost saving and improving productivity was also highlighted.			
	The SafeZone Alliance was promoted, noting it is free to join providing local responders support for alliance members organisations and user communities. Call to action to sign up allowing collaboration and supporting greater community benefit and improved productivity.			
	ACTION : It was agreed to jointly host a number of existing customers to look to how we make better use of SafeZone within a Cyber response solution.

4	Jason welcomed everyone to the Jisc innovation hub noting the easy creation of the space. He talked us though the thought process around the creation of the hub and the equipment including their Proto hologram.
	It was highlighted that technology is not the innovation and the importance of consistency across the estate. The psychology of having cameras on or off in meetings prompted a lengthy discussion. Everyone was in agreement that audio is key for ensuing a standout experience.
	Claire made an offer for colleagues to visit the Edinburgh Napier University Craiglockhart campus to view new developed academic spaces.

5	Data Centres Aberdeen & Robert Gordon University (RGU) & North East Scotland College have been running a shared service for over the last 10 years and are beginning to considering the next 10 years. The PUE (Power usage effectiveness) is so efficient that it presents challenges as we are forced to move to commercial and less efficient data centres. A flat cost rate is shared by all users which is reviewed annually. Diverse connectivity via Jisc was critical including the necessary approvals to share the network infrastructure across all three institutions.
	It was highlighted that co-location was discussed at Digital Scotland last week.
	ACTION : Can case studies and costs be shared with the membership at colleagues are keen to understand more about or offering.
	Jisc also have a two shared data centres available however uptake across Scotland has been poor to date.
	Library Management UHI & SRUC are sharing Library management systems and human resources.
